





Academic Assessment

Assessment Process and Structure

Assessment at CTU is defined as the process of learning how we know that our students are learning what we wanted them to learn. The University provides process structure and support for direct and indirect measures of assessment. Direct measures of assessment of curricular outcomes are evaluated using a variety of strategies including formats that include combinations of third-party examinations and simulations, common assignments, and capstones. Course-level assessment information is included within select courses' requirements as appropriate (e.g., course syllabus/syllabus addendum or course information). Specific examples of CTU's assessment methods include:

Some examples of program level measures of direct assessment include:

Program Review

All programs undergo program review once every three years. Approximately one-third of all programs are reviewed annually, this year totaled 45 programs. Program review encompasses a Strength, Weakness, Opportunity, Threat (SWOT) analysis, a data review (students, faculty, curriculum, assessment, industry standards alignment review), and strategic planning recommendations. Program review results are communicated to affected constituencies (including program committees, faculty, industry advisory councils, etc.)

Assessment Workshops

Assessment workshops are conducted in each college annually. In 2017 eight assessment workshops were conducted. The goals of workshops included conducting review and testing of current assessment strategies and identifying opportunities for improvement in assessment strategies. In Q4 of 2017, a virtual workshop format was piloted for Cyber programs across CTU and was supported with synchronous activities, asynchronous activities, and a content management platform.

Common Assessment Strategy

Common Assignment Strategy (CAS) is an assessment strategy utilized by CTU. CAS requires one common assignment, used identically across all modalities within a course of a program, which reflects the intended learning outcomes. This assignment is assessed with a common rubric to determine the program's effectiveness toward student learning.

Assessment Workshops were conducted throughout multiple academic units and during the year.

Co-Curricular and Extra-Curricular Assessment

In 2017, CTU, through its Co-Curricular and Extra-Curricular Assessment Sub- Committee (a component of the Academic Assessment Committee) identified three areas of focus for assessment beginning in 2018:

- Student Success
- Career Services
- Learning Services

Each of the targeted areas defined and executed an assessment plan and measured results. Decisions were made in each area as outlined below:


Assessment Focus	Decisions Based on Results
New Student Orientation—Focus on increasing student engagement.	Detailed reporting will continue to be used to identify coaches with stronger student outcomes to continue to share best practiced across teams and between coaches for improved student outcomes.
Use existing survey to determine level of service satisfaction.	The indirect assessment target to increase participation goals was not met for either population. CTU decided to evaluate career service survey timing to determine if a change would help to increase survey participation.
	The Embedded Librarian co-curricular assessment targets were met and the program will continue.
Include Embedded Librarian and Smarthinking into certain courses to determine if these learning services resources increase student success.	The Smarthinking co-curricular assessment targets were not met, although results demonstrated some improvement, with average course grades increasing 1.5%. Course grades did not improve. The Department of General Education will continue to partner with Learning Solutions to explore additional interventions to educate and encourage students about the use of these resources.


Doctoral Symposium

The CTU Library's fully digital collection consists of over 500,000,000 articles, 40,000 books, and hundreds of thousands of hours of video, all contained in approximately 50 subscription databases. Students have access to the collection via their classroom portal, 24 hours a day. The library director, six librarians, and support staff provide research assistance for students, faculty, and staff on each campus. Librarians conduct information literacy trainings specific to program, course, or assignment needs, in the classroom, in the online Learning Centers, and at special events such as the Doctoral Symposia.



Military

CTU supports the overall military voluntary education industry in a variety of ways. The university has personnel who serve on the Council of College and Military Educators (CCME) Board of Directors, attend state Advisory Councils on Military Education (ACME) conferences and base sponsored education fairs. In 2017, CTU supported and partnered with military affiliated organizations such as Enlisted Association of the National Guard of the United States (EANGUS) and Association of the United States Army (AUSA) as well as sponsored various outreach and fundraising events. Some of these events included: Colorado Springs Campus CTU Leadership Speakers Series with USAF Major Generals Jack Briggs and Nina Armagno, Buckley AFB Spouses' Denver South Campus visit, USAF Academy ESO Meet and Greet, the Colorado Springs Chamber Hail and Farewell, 64th National Security Forum, the Home Front Cares Veteran Cup Golf Tourney, Armed Forces Week Luncheon, Annual Yellow Ribbon Fund Golf Tournament, US Air Force Academy Change of Command, the Buckley AFB Spouse's Group Operation Ball Gown Collection and Donation and the Association of the US Army Conference.

In 2008, CTU created the Wounded Warrior Scholarship (renamed to Patriot Scholarship in 2017) in collaboration with the Yellow Ribbon Fund, Inc. to give back to those whose lives have been altered due to injury while serving in the United States Armed Forces. This scholarship is awarded annually to 50 eligible wounded service members, their spouses, dependents or their non-medical attendant or caregiver. Scholarship recipients receive a dedicated Student Success Coach, specially trained advisors to help support their academic journey, and have the option to pursue their degree either as an online or a campus-based student. As of December 31, 2017, CTU has awarded 500 of these scholarships, totaling over \$8.5 million.

Student Led Organizations

CTU maintains a variety of co-curricular activities that support and enrich the students' educational experiences. These activities focus on student interests and industry relevance. CTU recognizes the challenge of offering co-curricular programming to a non-traditional student population, consisting of commuter students and many working adults. CTU hosts student organizations that offer opportunities for student service, program-relevant learning, and community involvement. During 2017, CTU had numerous active student clubs and organizations:

The Student Senate at CTU represents the interests of students through governance and campus engagement:

- Annual Chili Cook-Off: Over the past four years, the Student Senate hosted a chili cook-off where the senate went head to head against all the clubs to see who has the best chili. It was also a fundraiser for the clubs.
- Meet and Greet Your New Student Senate: On August 9, 2017 the Student Senate catered a dinner for the students to meet their new Student Senators.
- Student Appreciation Weeks (AKA Free Coffee Week and Free Pizza Week): During start week the Student Senate, to welcome the students back to class, provided free coffee, tea, or cocoa. During finals week, all students received pizza and salad.
- Student Senate Classroom Contest: In the month of December, the Student Senate sponsored a Toys for Tots drive and challenged all the classrooms to bring in toys.
- Student Senate hosted a Holiday Party for students and an ugly sweater contest with prizes.

CTU Community Outreach

CTU is focused on opportunities to engage and support the communities surrounding our campuses. To that end, during 2017, there were a variety of activities CTU supported through varying levels of engagement and sponsorship:

Glossary of Terms

While most institutions of higher education use 'commonly accepted' terminology and definitions, exceptions can occur. To that end, the definitions highlighted below reflect definitions used by CTU.

Academic Year – CTU defines its Academic Year as three quarters. Each quarter is comprised of two 5.5-week sessions or one 11-week session, depending on program and modality.

Award Year – The Department of Education defines July 1 through June 30 as the award year.

Accreditation – A quality assurance process of evaluating colleges and universities to ensure the maintenance of educational standards.

Accreditation (Regional) – The accreditation granted by one of seven regional accreditation agencies in the United States. CTU is regionally accredited by the Higher Learning Commission (HLC). Hlcommission.org.

Accreditation (Programmatic) – The accreditation granted by a third-party institution for specialized programs.

Assessment (Direct) – The measurement of student performance of identified learning outcomes. Examples of direct measures are tests, standardized exams, and capstone courses.

Assessment (Indirect) – The measurement of the opinions and perceptions surrounding the student learning experience. Examples of indirect measures are student and faculty surveys.

Certification – An official document attesting to a level of achievement in a particular knowledge area.

Co-Curricular – An activity at a college that is an extension of the formal learning experience.

Cohort – A group of students who entered a degree program together or have other similar characteristics.

Degree Category – There are four main categories of degrees for postsecondary students – associate, bachelor's, master's, and doctoral. These are also referenced as degree levels.

Degree Program – The courses and credits contained within a specific area of study.

Extra-Curricular – An activity at a college pursued in addition to the typical course of study. Examples include student groups and clubs.

Fiscal Year – CTU's 12-month period for budgeting, forecasting, and reporting is January 1-December 31.

Graduation Rate – The percent of all students entering college for the first time graduating within 150% of the normal time for the student's program.

Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) – The Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System which consists of interrelated surveys conducted annually by the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics (NCES).

Licensure – The granting of a higher education institution to provide programs, concentrations, and courses of study toward student achievement of a degree.

Mission – A formal statement of the purpose of Colorado Technical University.

Physical Campus – Colorado Technical University has two physical campuses, located in Colorado Springs and Aurora, Colorado (Denver South).

Retention Rate – The percentage of students who continue their coursework through the year.

Symposium – A conference or meeting to discuss particular topics or subject areas. At CTU, this is part of the doctoral degree programs.

Virtual Campus – The Learning Platform used to deliver online courses at CTU.
